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INTRODUCTION


Jurik Research provides software "building blocks" for creating basic and advanced technical indicators within the popular platforms of Omega Research TradeStation, SuperCharts and MS Excel. We also have versions in DLL format for software developers.

THE BASIC INDICATORS


The basic indicators are JMA, VEL and CFB. All are designed to provide smooth curves with low lag because lag produces late trading signals that typically rob one of potential profits. We discovered that customers typically need to spend time unlearning common pre-conceived notions about the limitations of our technical indicators, limitations inherent in classical indicators due to excessive lag. After getting over this hurdle, users become very creative with our modules.

JMA

JMA (Jurik Moving Average) is the latest version of our popular low-lag adaptive moving average. JMA is designed to remove noise from any time series; however, unlike non-adaptive filters, JMA can distinguish between background noise and price gaps, filtering out the former but not the latter. This is extremely important in trading systems that run intra-day, as EOD price gaps can be huge. The chart below compares JMA against other non-adaptive moving averages, and shows how JMA converges to the new price level the fastest. T3 takes twice as long to converge, and it overshoots price data. Eliminating these shortcomings can make all the difference in a trade.



Unlike most other filters that filter noise poorly, JMA remains smooth. The chart below compares several filters on a simulated noisy, gapping and trending time series. All filters are producing the same amount of jittery response to the noisy signal, but only JMA and TEMA can track close to the noise-free trend line (shown in gray). Again, JMA converges to the true trend line sooner than all the others, and for some trades this makes all the difference.




VEL

A measure of true (noise free) price velocity (momentum) can be extremely useful. However, the classic Momentum indicator is plagued with noise. Attempts to reduce this noise by either running it through a moving average or by taking the slope of a regression line through the time series reduces noise but creates significant lag at critical price turning points. In contrast, VEL measures the velocity of a time series smoothly, accurately and without lagging behind the raw momentum signal.

In the chart below, we see the classical momentum line (gray) smoothed by a simple moving average (red) and by VEL (cyan). Note how VEL smoothes the time series <u>without adding any additional lag in the process</u>. Consequently, VEL finds reversals sooner.



Many users also exploit VEL's accuracy in another way. Although price may still be rising, its divergence with VEL signifies a trend is losing energy and is likely to reverse. For example, in the chart below, the divergence between lines B in the price and VEL charts signifies deceleration and eventual price trend reversal. The continued divergence at lines C suggested continued price reduction. This is very difficult to attain with the classical momentum indicator because its inherent noise obscures the true value of price velocity.



CFB


CFB (Composite Fractal Behavior) is an indicator whose application is subtle, yet once users have figured it out, they have used CFB to create the most clever applications that I've seen of all our tools. It simultaneously measures trend duration and trend quality. The longer a quality trend plays out, the larger CFB's index value. When trend speed slows down, or volatility picks up (thereby degrading trend quality), the CFB index rapidly declines. Note that it declines at the end of upward or downward trends.

Because CFB is very sensitive to trend degradation, it has been used successfully as a trend exit signal. In the chart below, each time CFB falls off its peak, the overall trend in the price time series terminates.



CFB was originally intended to serve as a means to dynamically adjust other indicators "on the fly" as a function of trend duration and quality. For example, many users have discovered that letting CFB's output modulate the length of RSI on a bar-by-bar basis almost always produces results superior to an RSI whose length parameter is fixed for the entire duration of the time series. This result confirms similar results published by Murray Ruggiero, regarding the use of MESA for the same purpose. With MESA, estimates of dominant cycle lengths were used to modify the length of other indicators. Unlike MESA, CFB does not rely on getting the correct a-priori model, nor is it as susceptible to signal noise. This is because CFB does not assume there are any cycles in the time series. Instead CFB looks for numerous fractal like patterns, a process more resilient to noise. The latest version of CFB will search for fractals up to 192 bars in length.

CFB has some resemblance to the commonly used technical indicator ADX. However, it is superior to ADX in its ability to assess strengthening and weakening trends. For example, in the chart below, a strong downward trend begins to breakdown as increasing retracement and volatility develop. Although CFB reveals this weakening strength (1), ADX continues to indicate a growing trend (3). Next, CFB picks up a growing trend (2) but ADX completely misses it (4).


RSX

RSI is very popular and falls in the same class of indicators as does RWI (random walk index) and KER (Kaufman's Efficiency Ratio). Unfortunately, RSI, as formulated in almost all software apps is very noisy. Attempts to smooth it out using classical moving averages degrade the signal by adding lag and distorting the RSI's true amplitude.

Jurik Research has reformulated RSI so that it is smooth and has very little lag. Consequently, users say they exclusively use our version of RSI, called RSX. The chart compares our RSX with that provided by Omega Research TradeStation ®.

Many users have expressed thanks for providing demonstration trading systems that use JMA and RSX that, with a few adjustments on their part, becomes profitable in real time trading.



ADVANCED INDICATORS

After pushing JMA, VEL, CFB and RSX as far as they can go, the advanced user asks us to take his system to the next performance level. This involves implementing <u>leading</u> indicators of the user's own design. Profitable leading indicators are not trivial algorithms, as they are required to "see" what the market has not yet already discounted. Various versions of neural nets are the modeling paradigms typically used to create leading indicators. Nonetheless, for any model type employed, the data used to create models needs to be pre-processed for several reasons:


- 1. Models may need to be fed a short or long history of one or more input variables.
- 2. Simpler models usually have more reliable performance.
- 3. Simpler models are easier to create and test.

The two modules we have that serve the above two objectives are WAV and DDR.

Neural Networks and Financial Forecasting

The very first step toward making a leading indicator requires the developer to decide how far into the future the leading indicator is to forecast. Our book, Neural Networks and Financial Forecasting, provides a formula for determining the optimal forecast horizon of any time series. The book also provides a heuristic for estimating the maximum amount of history required of each input (independent) variable for the model to make such a forecast. For example, we determined that the optimal horizon using daily 30 Yr. T-bonds as the target time series is 5.5 days, and that to "see" that far into the future, a model needs to "see" 22 days of history. I published this finding into what is now called the Journal of Computational Finance. It was one of the first published works that combined chaos theory and information theory into a formula with a very practical application in the financial arena. (For a brief outline on my theory of an optimal forecast horizon, see Appendix F.)

After determining the optimal forecast horizon, and the consequent maximum history that may be required of all independent time series feeding the leading indicator, the next step for the developer is to transform each input time series into a set of numbers that span the requisite history. Please refer to the diagram below.




For example, suppose a user has chosen to feed his leading indicator five time series (S&P Fast K, S&P velocity, DOW velocity, DOW MACD, TRIN). Also suppose he decided that, at most, 48 bars of history is needed from each of the five input time series for the indicator to make a forecast. He could simply take the last 48 bars of each time series and feed them into the leading indicator, as shown in the diagram. This would produce 5X48 or 240 independent variables for the forecasting model. For reasons I outlined in both the book "Virtual Trading" and in an article in "Artificial Intelligence in Finance", 240 variables is way too many. We need a method for capturing the same amount of history with significantly fewer variables, so as to approach the goal of creating the

smallest model possible.

This goal is accomplished with our modules WAV and DDR.

WAV


At any point in time, WAV will efficiently capture historical information of a time series relative to that point and express that information with significantly fewer samples than that produced by the example given above. WAV does this by filtering and sub-sampling the data in a unique way so as to retain relevant short, medium and long cycle length behavior. In the example above, WAV would produce only 12 variables for each input time series, producing a total of 5x12 or 60 variables. Compared to the method described earlier, WAV delivers a 75% reduction in the degrees of freedom for the model, a significant improvement. See left diagram below.



DDR

By reducing the number of samples required to span history, WAV is performing "temporal compression". More compression can be attained another way. For example, when three values are used to fully describe a "state" of a system, (e.g. the local weather), we can say that the model is representing the weather in 3 dimensions of feature space. Now, in the above example, the leading indicator is being fed data that might occupy 60 dimensions. But because many economic indicators are redundant, they collectively describe the state of a dynamic system (the market) that is probably spanning much fewer dimensions, maybe as little as 6. What is needed is a way to compress the 60 input variables into a smaller collection, such that the smaller set still faithfully describes the market's dynamics. We call this "spatial compression".

DDR (Decorrelator and Dimension Reducer) performs spatial compression, using a powerful algorithm based on principle component analysis. Luckily, the user does not need to know anything about how DDR works in order to employ it. In the example above, DDR may discover that the 60 input variables were highly redundant and actually span only 15 dimensions of feature space. Consequently, DDR will create 15 new time series for the forecasting model. Please refer to the diagram below. A result of 15 variables from 240 represents a whopping 93.7% reduction in the degrees of freedom for the forecasting model.



As an added benefit, all 15 time-series produced by DDR are mutually decorrelated. This is perfect for regression type neural networks, such as Braincel.

WAV and DDR together perform spatio-temporal compression very effectively. Ever since Jurik Research published the concept of data compression in Futures Magazine in 1992, it is becoming increasingly popular among forecast model builders. An entire issue has since been devoted to this topic in the Journal of Computational Finance.

Appendix D contains user comments about the WAV and DDR modules. In particular, one user has developed an intraday leading indicator of the S&P that is exhibiting less than 10% error. Needless to say, he is very pleased.

SUMMARY

JMA, VEL, CFB and RSX cover important features of price action: location, velocity, trend duration & quality. Their low lag greatly improves chances of developing a profitable trading system. Until recently, low lag tracking indicators were not readily available to the average investor, although the U.S. military (my background) has been working on them for decades in other applications (tracking missiles and submarines).

DDR and WAV provide powerful data preprocessing for leading indicators. They are typically used first on an Excel spreadsheet, where the row and column format is particularly useful for model building. Although we sell Braincel (by Promised Land Technology) as a neural net add-in module for Excel, WAV and DDR can preprocess data for any modeling paradigm, because the theory of data compression remains the same.

Users of TradeStation can develop their neural net models in MS Excel and then later employ them in TradeStation, providing the capability of neural net based indicators running in real-time (perfect for day trading).

APPENDIX F

The notion of an optimal forecast horizon

The financial market has too many unknown driving forces pushing on it at different time frames. So we try to understand as much as possible from one or more time series, such as price, volume, advances & declines, etc. If we assume, for the moment, the market is not driven by random external forces, then theoretically, we can attempt to reconstruct the inner dynamics of the market using Takens Theorem. (ref 1). Takens Embedding Theorem states that a chaotic process can be predicted by a smooth function if properly embedded. Nonlinear models (e.g., neural nets, fuzzy logic) may be used to model the smooth functions. Over the last two decades, this has led to a wide variety of new techniques for analyzing and manipulating time series, including algorithms for the measurement of fractal dimensions and Lyapunov exponents, for the prediction of future behavior and noise reduction.

With regards to predicting future behavior, the Efficient Market Hypothesis, which held sway until the early 90s, suggested that the time progression of the markets would appear as a random walk, that history does not influence the future. However, evidence of limited predictability forced onto the table the Coherent Market Hypothesis, which takes discoveries of chaos and non-linearity in financial series into account.

One aspect of chaos analysis, the Lyapunov exponent (L), measures the degree current states about a system will persist in the future. When L<0, you have a "dissipative" system where the noise evaporates and the system settles into a steady state. For example, smacking your hand into a pot of water will create a lot of disturbance but after a short while, all the noise has dissipated and the stable state returns. When L>0, the reverse occurs. It's the current state of the system that eventually dissipates, and the noise remains, such as the weather. Some states have both types running simultaneously, such as the markets.

The fact that a state (e.g. the market is trending) does not disappear immediately, means the system has memory, albeit a fading one. This raises an interesting point about forecasting. With a positive L, the further the forecast horizon, the more difficult it is to make an accurate forecast. That's intuitive. However, because of a large amount of noise present in the market (due to random external driving forces), very short range forecasts are also very difficult to make accurate. For example, one needs to wait until trend accumulates sufficiently to break through the noise before it becomes clear. That is why we prefer using 8 bar momentum rather than 4. That latter is too noisy to be of much use.

So we are squeezed on both sides: noise deteriorates short term forecasts and memory loss (L>0) deteriorates long term forecasts. This suggests there might be an optimal forecast horizon somewhere in between. I proposed an algorithm for determining the optimal horizon in a journal in 1993 (ref 2) and in a book (ref 3) that we currently sell.

This theory explains why my software greatly enhances trading system performance: system noise and information dissipation are the two buggers one needs to work around when trying to get a semi-clear picture of a system (e.g. the market) and it's future behavior. That's why low lag and low noise indicators are so important: they offer the broadest forecast horizon.

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
